INTRODUCTION TO ANIMALS: SAFETY AND CARE

Lessons about animals and what they need designed to teach children empathy and responsibility.

Pet Care Basics: Programs include a discussion of
what HSCC does for the community, what it means
to be a responsible pet owner, and being safe
around all animals

Pet Safety: Learn the "Do's and Don'ts" of safety
around our animal friends. Students will recognize the
body language of dogs and cats and learn how to
respond in various situations. Videos, visual aids and
role playing activities can also be provided.

FARM ANIMAL SERIES:

Your educator will call prior to the visit to discuss which program is available at that time

- Animals on the Farm: An introduction to farm animals; the products and services they provide. This program can also be adapted (for older groups) to include current trends in farming and their effects on consumers and the small local farmer.
- 2. "Getting your Goat": Goats are very important to humans throughout the world as dairy animals, meat, for pack animals and for browsing shrubs, vines and clearing land. These versatile, gentle and curious farm animals can also be fun loving pets. Students can learn facts about goats, their behavior, life cycle and care. A chance to meet and milk a real Nubian Dairy goat that can still produce milk every day. (30 students maximum, outdoors only (weather permitting) an morning programs only.
- 3. "Egg-citement": Which came first, the chicken or the egg? Learn all about eggs and the creatures that lay eggs (hint: chickens are not the only ones!) Students I become "egg-sperts", "eggs-ploring" the uses of eggs for hatching or eating while learning about diversity as they meet chickens from all of the world. Classes may choose to learn about egg incubation in the classroom.
- 4. <u>Talkin' Turkey:</u> ,Turkeys are not just for Thanksgiving Dinner! Learn the history of this truly American bird, life cycle, behavior, and special characteristics of both the wild and domesticated barnyard gobbler. Hear a children's Thanksgiving story and have an opportunity to feed and touch a real "Tom Turkey" of a rare heritage breed.

Getting a Bat Attitude: Bats are often one of the most misunderstood and feared animals, but are also really amazing, helpful and important creatures. Learn fascinating bat facts, their adaptations and role in our local habitat.
☐ Deer, Oh Deer: The White-Tailed Deer population in Charles County is robust despite shrinking habitat. Learn the biology and life cycle of our native deer. Discuss issue about population control from a variety of perspectives.
☐ Black Bears: This program is a hands on introduction into the world of the black bear. Learn about the native wildlife species that has made a remarkable comeback.
☐ Groundhogs: Learn all about groundhogstheir habitat, hibernation, what they eat, anatomy, whether they really can predict when winter will end and much more.
☐ Wild About Worms: Vermicomposting is a great way to help the environment by recycling your kitchen trash into wonderful fertilizer for your plants. We will learn about amazing earthwormsthe most useful, undemanding pets. Students may choose to establish their own vermicomposting bins.
Raising Rabbits Responsibly: Think carefully before you bring home that adorable Easter Bunny! Students will learn all about rabbit breeds, care, nutrition and life cycle.

- Animals in Winter: A flannel board presentation which helps students understand how local wild creatures' unique adaptations help them survive the cold
 - season.
- Wild Birds in our Backyard: teaches the audience to recognize common feeder bird species and learn about their anatomy and adaptations.
- Summer Safety Outdoors: Practical information about safety around domestic or wild animals. Discussion will also include facts about rabies, ticks and Lyme Disease, bee stings, snakes, spiders, West Nile Virus and even poison ivy..

Talking Bones: Students can learn to be "forensic" investigators by observing skulls of animals to discove characteristics that will reveal whether the animal is herbivore, carnivore or omnivore. The size, shape, teeth, brain size and nasal cavities give clues about the habitat and life cycle of native Maryland species.
Jeepers Creepers: Creeping Crawlers are all around us! Students will learn why even the creepiest creature is essential to our world. Discuss ecosystems, food web, adaptations and habitats.
