

Classroom Pet FAQ's

<u>What is a Classroom pet?</u> A classroom pet is an animal that is fostered by a regular teacher throughout the school year. Caring for an animal is an invaluable experience for children so having a pet that is part of the class throughout the year can benefit the students in many ways. Teach kindness, responsibility, compassion and empathy.

<u>Who can have a Classroom Pet?</u> If you are a teacher with a classroom full of children interested in animals you may qualify to take part in our new Class Pet Project. Any educator that is regularly in a classroom that makes the promise to be responsible, kind and take care of the needs of the animal may qualify for the program.

How does the program work? The Humane Society will supply the pet, the support, and cover any health issues that may arise. Your classroom provides all of the pet supplies and daily care. The entire class will adopt the animal for the school year. The educator and class must promise to care for the pet even when school is not in session. This means holidays, weekends and school breaks. Once the year is over, the teacher or a student may fill out a final adoption application for a permanent home. If the teacher decides that a class pet is not the right fit for their classroom, you may return the pet to The Humane Society of Charles County at any time.

<u>How does the class learn to care properly for the Classroom Pet?</u> To kick off the program, the class will receive a pet care/pocket pet presentation by a Humane Educator. This will teach the children about the needs of domesticated animals and the regular responsibilities that humans must accomplish for the pet to stay healthy and happy.

What will the students learn during the Classroom Pet Project? Through this program the children will learn responsibility, compassion, respect, fairness and even citizenship. Not only do they consistently learn about character education, you can use the opportunity the animal brings to teach language arts skills through writing activities, math skills with overpopulation, the cost of caring activities and pet supplies, social studies skills in learning the culture in which the animal originates and its history of becoming a pet and even science when you study the animal itself.

What type of animals makes the best classroom pet? Pocket pets, such as guinea pigs, rabbits and rats are the most popular class pet because they have their own habitat and are kept safe within their cage. It is most likely that fewer children will have allergies to a pocket pet and in many ways there is less care. It is always a good idea to have the children help with the daily cleaning and care of the pet, this teaches responsibility.
